Cleveland Woman Gives Laboratory to Mt. Holyoke

CORNELIA Clapp Hall, the biological building nearing completion at Mount Holyoke college, has 121 rooms, laboratories, offices, lecture and photographic rooms, besides stair halls, corridors and coat-rooms. Without the museum wing originally planned, it covers an area of nearly a half acre and has a floor space of 71,927 square feet.

Many a student might lose her way in its expanse, but all who come from Cleveland will find in the vast building two spots which, to paraphrase the poet's lines, "are forever Cleveland."
